
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Oklahoma had <u>84,219</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, <u>34,139</u> were screened in for response by CPS.
- 13,198 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 13.7 children per 1,000 (12.9% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 13,198 children, 10,290 were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 2,005 of the 13,198 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




Workforce

There are <u>6,160</u> children, family, and school social workers in Oklahoma with a mean wage of \$20.97 (compared to Oklahoma's minimum wage: \$7.25)



Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 80.1% = parents of the child.
- 19.8% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 50.4% = female; 49.5% = male.
- Child fatalities decreased from <u>29</u> in 2022 to <u>17</u> in 2023.
- Oklahoma reported 3 total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 13,859 victims and 45,895 non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, 2023



Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>10,983</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 7,013 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **3,509** children entered care and **3,970** exited.
- 1,629 children were adopted; 3,393 were waiting to be adopted.
- 6.2% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also increased by 9% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021





Juvenile Justice


- <u>7,195</u> total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 552 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 1,513 for Property Crimes.
- 1,022 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>261</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from **345** kids in 2019; 24% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? <u>2021</u>



- In 2021, 203 children exited foster care due to age (23% increase from 2020).
- 3,629 children were living with non-relatives; 2,388 stayed with a relative.
- 473 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 44 children classified as runaways.
- 4% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Oklahoma spent <u>\$426,430,125.45</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$220,720,870 = from the federal government
- \$199,617,326 = from state and local funds.


Federal Funding Sources, 2020



The significant funding sectors of the \$220,720,870 in federal funding received in Oklahoma in 2020:

- \$52,787,516 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$92,688,413 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Oklahoma's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$32,843,746

Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>31%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 14% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 25% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$10,065</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$8,704 annual cost of home-based infant care






Child Poverty

- <u>260,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (27% of all children).
- <u>27%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>11,240</u> in 2021 to <u>8,168</u> in 2022 (27.3% decrease).


Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>



HOUSING


- <u>6,409</u> children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (3.32%)
- 29.3% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>27%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>15,817</u> total Oklahoma residents living in public housing

Child Poverty Over Time



- The state spent \$49,608,107 on WIC in 2023, serving 10,423 people: a 2.0% increase in total participants and 25.7% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>672,170</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 223,890 children.
- **45.2**% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Oklahoma, <u>2020</u>








Health

- 4,117 low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (8.6% of births).
- <u>5,772</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (11.9% of births).
 - 11.6% of all White babies
 - 16.3% of all Black babies
- <u>2,855</u> births to mothers aged 15–19 in 2023 a rate of **21** in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>337</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of 7 per 1,000.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2021</u>




Medicaid Expansion

Oklahoma has been a <u>Medicaid</u> expansion state since 07/01/2021.

Maternal Mortality

- <u>72</u> Oklahoma women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in Oklahoma, there is **30** maternal deaths
- <u>73,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (2.67% decrease from 2021).
- <u>515,801</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (2.3% increase from 2020).
- 237,437 children in Oklahoma were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (8.2% increase from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








Zero to Three

- 48.4% of babies live above low-income
- 27.8% of babies live at low income
- 23.8% of babies live in poverty
- 11.7% of babies live in deep poverty
- 76.4% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

20.1%

- In 2023, Oklahoma reported <u>2,231</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Oklahoma reported 85 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Oklahoma <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.

Teens & Youth

- <u>19,000</u> youth (16–19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (8%)
- <u>73</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Oklahoma in 2020.

Mental Health

- <u>33,436</u> children received mental health treatment in Oklahoma in 2022 (1.8%)
- In 2022, there were <u>15.5</u> suicide deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in Oklahoma.

Treatment Type for Youth with Substance Use Disorder, <u>2023</u>



- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>38,572</u> children in Oklahoma (2.7% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>4,517</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD
