
## Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Pennsylvania had <u>39,138</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. All 39,138 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 4,455 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 1.7 children per 1,000 (7.5% decrease since 2019).
- Of the **4,455** children, **4,164** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = 15 years, representing 385 of the 4,455 cases.




Workforce

There are <u>18,340</u> children, family, and school social workers in Pennsylvania with a mean wage of **\$26.04** (compared to Pennsylvania's minimum wage: **\$7.25**)

### Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




#### Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- <u>55.9%</u> = parents of the child.
- 44% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 62.3% = female; 37.6% = male.
- Child fatalities decreased from <u>80</u> in 2022 to <u>50</u> in 2023.
- Pennsylvania reported **24** total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to **4,659** victims and **34,479** non-victims.

#### Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2023</u>






## Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>20,082</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 12,465 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **6,961** children entered care and **7,617** exited.
- 2,184 children were adopted; 2,975 were waiting to be adopted.
- 8.7% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 1.4% from 2021.

### Duration in Care, 2021








- In 2021, <u>793</u> children exited foster care due to age (13.9% decrease from 2020).
- 5,597 children were living with non-relatives; 6,010 stayed with a relative.
- 1,476 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 137 children classified as runaways.
- <u>3%</u> of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

### Adoption, <u>2020</u>





## Funding for Child Welfare Services


- Pennsylvania spent <u>\$1,887,950,707</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
  - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- **\$456,474,947** = from the federal government
- \$1,400,226,601 = from state and local funds.



# The significant funding sectors of the \$<u>456,472,947</u> in federal funding received in Pennsylvania in 2020:

- \$163,011,230 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$130,350,081 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Pennsylvania sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$92,390,274






# Child Poverty


- <u>657,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (25% of all children).
- <u>25%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients rose from <u>64,727</u> in 2021 to <u>70,470</u> in 2022 (8.87% increase).

Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>




## HOUSING

- <u>11,313</u> children, from birth to threeyears-old, are experiencing homelessness (2.13%)
- <u>25.3%</u> of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>25%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>98,971</u> total Pennsylvania residents living in public housing



- The state spent <u>\$117,347,052</u> on WIC in 2023, serving 170,254 people: a 7.6% increase in total participants and 34.8% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>1,538,100</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 436,250 children.
- **33.9%** of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

#### Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Pennsylvania, <u>2020</u>








# Health

- <u>10,703</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (**8.4**% of births).
- <u>13,006</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (9.8% of births).</li>
  - 8.81% of all White babies
  - 14.21% of all Black babies
- <u>4,077</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 -- a rate of 10 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>714</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2021; a rate of 6 per 1,000.

#### Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2021</u>




## Medicaid Expansion

Pennsylvania has been a <u>Medicaid</u> <u>expansion</u> state since 01/01/2015.

### Maternal Mortality

- <u>116</u> Pennsylvania women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in Pennsylvania, there is **18** maternal deaths
  - <u>145,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (15.08% increase from 2021).
  - <u>1,297,856</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (4.9% increase from 2020).
- <u>295,698</u> children in Pennsylvania were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (17.3% decrease from 2020).






## Zero to Three

- <u>64.0%</u> of babies live above low-income
- 16.9% of babies live at low income
- 19.1% of babies live in poverty
- 9.6% of babies live in deep poverty
- 73.6% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

### Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Pennsylvania did not report any infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Pennsylvania reported no plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Pennsylvania <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.


## Teens & Youth

- <u>35,000</u> youth (16–19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (5%)
- <u>169</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Pennsylvania in 2020.

## Mental Health

- <u>155,973</u> children received mental health treatment in Pennsylvania in 2022 (8.4%)
- In 2022, there were <u>8.6</u> suicide deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15–19 in Pennsylvania.

### Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>65,981</u> children in Pennsylvania (1.7% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>4,747</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD
