
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Puerto Rico had <u>17,499</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 10,307 were screened in for response by CPS.
- **4,446** child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of **8.9** children per 1,000 (6.2% decrease since 2019).
- Of the **4,446** children, **4,092** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = 13 years, representing 296 of the 4,446 cases.

Workforce

There are <u>6,000</u> children, family, and school social workers in Puerto Rico with a mean wage of \$14 (compared to Puerto Rico's minimum wage: \$10.50)


Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 70.6% = parents of the child.
- 29.3% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 51.0% = female; 48.8% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>4</u> in 2022 to 5 in 2023.
- Puerto Rico reported 0 total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to **5,245** victims and **14,098** non-victims.

Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, 2023








Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>2,540</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 2,136 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **621** children entered care and **404** exited.
- 86 children were adopted; 396 were waiting to be adopted.
- 0.05% increase in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system decreased by 33.3% from 2021.


Duration in Care, 2021


The decrease since 2020 in children transitioning from foster care to independence.

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? <u>2021</u>



- In 2021, <u>2</u> children exited foster care due to age (50% decrease from 2020).
- 597 children were living with non-relatives; 517 stayed with a relative.
- 807 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 9 children classified as runaways.
- <u>3%</u> of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

Adoption, 2020








Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Puerto Rico spent \$200,118,344.75 on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$111,103,505.11 = from the federal government
- \$89,014,839.64 = from state and local funds.

Federal Funding Sources, 2020



The significant funding sectors of the \$111,103,505.11 in federal funding received in Puerto Rico in 2020:

- \$81,080,568 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$2,127,824 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Puerto Rico's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$15,424,533

- 19,381 annual enrollment for Head Start Preschool
- \$220,910,561 Head Start Preschool Annual Operations Funded
- 5,158 enrollment for Early Head Start
- \$99,424548 Early Head Start Operations Funded Amount






Child Poverty

- <u>256,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (49% of all children).
- <u>29%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients fell from <u>12,000</u> in 2021 to <u>9,844</u> in 2022 (17.97% decrease).

Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>



HOUSING


- 1,100 children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (1.40%)
- 34.2% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>27%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- 225,568 total Puerto Rican residents living in public housing projects.

• Puerto Rico spent \$137,801,720 on WIC in 2023, serving 84,979 people: a 7.59% decrease in total participants and 13% increase in spending since 2022.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Puerto Rico, <u>2020</u>








Health

- <u>1,133</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (12% of births).
- <u>2,322</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (12% of births).
 - 12% of all White babies
 - 19.2% of all Black babies
- <u>1,265</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2021 -- a rate of 13 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>132</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2021 -- a rate of **6.8** in every 1,000 infants.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, 2021




Medicaid Expansion

Puerto Rico has adopted <u>Medicaid</u> expansion since 2016.

Maternal Mortality

- Puerto Rico reported <u>34.0</u> maternal deaths per every 100,000 live births in 2020. A 61.9% increased since 2019.
- <u>13,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (18.75% decrease from 2021).
- <u>335,000</u> children were enrolled in public health insurance in 2022 (3.7% decrease from 2021).
- <u>21,000</u> children in Puerto Rico had both public and private health insurance in 2022 (5% increase from 2021).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








Zero to Three

- 17.6% of babies live above low-income
- 25.0% of babies live at low income
- 57.4% of babies live in poverty
- 39.3% of babies live in deep poverty

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Puerto Rico reported <u>22</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Puerto Rico reported 21 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Puerto Rico <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.

Teens & Youth

- <u>18,000</u> youth (16–19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (12%)
- <u>58</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Puerto Rico in 2020.

Mental Health

- <u>626</u> children received mental health treatment in Puerto Rico in 2022 (0.0%)
- In 2019, <u>12%</u> of children in Puerto Rico grades 9th through 12th seriously considered suicide.

Substance Use
