

Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Rhode Island had <u>14,204</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, **4,839** were screened in for response by CPS.
- 2,514 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 12.3 children per 1,000 (21% decrease since 2019).
- Of the **2,514** children, **1,737** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 332 of the 2,514 cases.

Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




- <u>79.5%</u> = parents of the child.
- 20.5% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

35

- 50.1% = female; 49.6% = male.
- Child fatalities decreased from <u>2</u> in 2022 to <u>1</u> in 2023.
- Rhode Island reported 1 total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 2,620 victims and 4,596 non-victims.






Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>2,608</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 1,723 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **812** children entered care and **885** exited.
- 252 children were adopted; 241 were waiting to be adopted.
- 5.5% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system increased by 9.1% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021








- In 2021, <u>107</u> children exited foster care due to age (28.2% decrease from 2020).
- 546 children were living with non-relatives; 684 stayed with a relative.
- 230 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 11 children classified as runaways.
- <u>3%</u> of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

Adoption, <u>2020</u>





Funding for Child Welfare Services


- Rhode Island spent <u>\$232,456,094.90</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$78,535,559.34 = from the federal government
- \$152,052,335.35 = from state and local funds.




The significant funding sectors of the \$<u>78,535,559.34</u> in federal funding received in Rhode Island in 2020:

- \$14,285,330 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$8,900,892 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Rhode Island's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was <u>\$11,114,326</u>






Child Poverty


- <u>44,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (22% of all children).
- <u>29%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- Average number of TANF recipients rose from <u>5,466</u> in 2021 to <u>7,316</u> in 2022 (33.8% increase).

Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>




HOUSING

- <u>366</u> children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (0.88%)
- <u>24.0%</u> of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>29%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>13,963</u> total Rhode Island residents living in public housing



- The state spent <u>\$10,687,197</u> on WIC in 2023, serving 17,235 people: a 6.46% increase in total participants and 41.7% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>118,890</u> people were food insecure in 2021, including 29,770 children.
- 30.3% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Urban Population 91.1%






Health

- <u>753</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (7.7% of births).
- <u>1,009</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (9.7% of births).
 - 8.82% of all White babies
 - 11.80% of all Black babies
- <u>271</u> births to mothers aged 15–19 in 2023 -- a rate of 7 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>47</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of 5 per 1,000.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2021</u>




Medicaid Expansion

Rhode Island has been a <u>Medicaid</u> <u>expansion</u> state since 01/01/2014.


Maternal Mortality

- **9** Rhode Island women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- Rhode Island did not report a number of maternal deaths per every 100,000 live births
- <u>5,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2022 (16.7% decrease from 2021).
- <u>108,175</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (1.1% decrease from 2020).
- <u>33,974</u> children in Rhode Island were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (4.5% increase from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








Zero to Three

- <u>67.0%</u> of babies live above low-income
- 20.2% of babies live at low income
- 12.8% of babies live in poverty
- 6.2% of babies live in deep poverty
- **85.0%** of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Rhode Island reported <u>71</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Rhode Island reported 0 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Rhode Island <u>has a Family First plan</u> approved by the administration.

Teens & Youth

- <u>2,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (4%)
- <u>0</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Rhode Island in 2020.

Mental Health

- <u>7,092</u> children received mental health treatment in Rhode Island in 2022 (0.4%)
- In 2022, there were <u>5.0</u> suicide deaths per 100,000 adolescents aged 15–19 in Rhode Island.

Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>6,405</u> children in Rhode Island (2.0% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>461</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD
