
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, South Carolina had <u>68,378</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 37,670 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 13,628 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 11.9 children per 1,000 (27.2% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 13,628 children, 9,631 were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 1,877 of the 13,628 cases.


Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023



There are <u>5,020</u> children, family, and school social workers in South Carolina with a mean wage of \$21.62 (compared to South Carolina's minimum wage: \$7.25)



Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 93.8% = parents of the child.
- **6.2**% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 51.3% = female; 48.7% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>38</u> in 2022 to <u>43</u> in 2023.
- South Carolina reported 81 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to **4,921** victims and **8,588** non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, 2023



Foster Care and Adoptions

- 6,735 total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- **3,793** in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 2,868 children entered care and 2.942 exited.
- 501 children were adopted; 1,513 were waiting to be adopted.
- 3.6% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system increased by 9.1% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021





Juvenile Justice


- 9,403 total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- **865** for Disorderly Conduct.
- 1,918 for Property Crimes.
- 1,375 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- 414 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 633 kids in 2019; 35% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? <u>2021</u>



- In 2021, 256 children exited foster care due to age (6.2% decrease from 2020).
- 1,647 children were living with nonrelatives; 1,322 stayed with a relative.
- 152 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 38 children classified as runaways.
- 42.9% ?? of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

The decline since 34.6% 2019 of children living in juvenile correction facilities.






Funding for Child Welfare Services

- South Carolina spent <u>\$272,643,128.96</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$159,785,995.01 = from the federal government
- \$102,665,504.38 = from state and local funds.


Federal Funding Sources, 2021



The significant funding sectors of the <u>\$\$159,785,995.01</u> in federal funding received in South Carolina in 2020:

- \$48,702,333.00 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$24,334,523.00 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- South Carolina's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$24,617,631

Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>20%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 7% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 10% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$9,048</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$7,150 annual cost of home-based infant care






Child Poverty

- <u>315,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (28% of all children).
- Average number of TANF recipients increased from <u>7,305</u> in 2021 to <u>14,860</u> in 2022 (103.4% increase).

Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




• 4,120 children, from birth to threeyears-old, are experiencing homelessness (1.81%)

HOUSING


- 44% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>26%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- 24,256 total South Carolina residents living in public housing

Child Poverty Over Time



- The state spent \$55,294,029 on WIC in 2023, serving 92,799 people: a 7.6% increase in total participants and 37.9% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>753,193</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including 206,343 children.
- <u>48.3%</u> of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of South Carolina, 2020








Health

- <u>5,750</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (7.6% of births).
- <u>6,903</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (12.1%).
 - 10.5% of all White babies
 - 15.88% of all Black babies
- <u>2,965</u> births to mothers aged 15–19 in 2023 a rate of 18 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>390</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023 -- a rate of 7 per 1,000.

Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, 2021




Medicaid Expansion

South Carolina is not a <u>Medicaid</u> expansion state.

Maternal Mortality

- <u>92</u> South Carolina women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in South Carolina, there are **32** maternal deaths
 - 74,000 children had no health insurance in 2023 (1.4% increase from 2022).
 - <u>638,211</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (0.7% increase from 2020).
 - 107,946 children in South Carolina were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (3.3% decrease from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>








Zero to Three

- 53.8% of babies live above low-income
- 23.7% of babies live at low income
- 22.6% of babies live in poverty
- 12.6% of babies live in deep poverty
- 74.7% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, South Carolina reported <u>636</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- South Carolina did not report any plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

South Carolina <u>has a Family First</u> <u>plan</u> approved by the administration.


Teens & Youth

- <u>23,000</u> youth (16-19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (8%)
- 125 children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in South Carolina in 2022.

Mental Health

- <u>34,492</u> children received mental health treatment in South Carolina in 2022 (1.9%)
- In 2022, there were <u>12.9</u> deaths by suicide per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in South Carolina.

Treatment Type for Youth with Substance Use Disorder, <u>2023</u>



• From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>27,368</u> children in South Carolina (1.9% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.

Substance Use

 On March 31st, 2023, <u>1,582</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD
