
Child Maltreatment

- In 2022, South Dakota had <u>15,248</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those,
 2,618 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 1,445 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 6.5 children per 1,000 (6% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 1,445 children, 1,091 were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 243 of the 1,445 cases.

Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




Workforce

There are 1,780 children, family, and school social workers in South Dakota with a mean wage of \$23.93 (compared to South Dakota's minimum wage: \$11.20)



Child Victims by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 91.7% = parents of the child.
- 8.3% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- 51% = female; 49% = male.
- Child fatalities decreased from <u>13</u> in 2022 to 7 in 2023.
- South Dakota reported 0 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 721 victims and 275 non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2023</u>



Foster Care and Adoptions

- 2,553 total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 1,615 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, 947 children entered care and 938 exited.
- 247 children were adopted; 503 were waiting to be adopted.
- 1.9% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system increased by 11.3% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021




The increase since 2020 10.4% in children transitioning from foster care to independence.

Juvenile Justice


- **4,791** total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 476 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 547 for Property Crimes. 754 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- 99 children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from 171 kids in 2019; **42**% decline).

Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, <u>69</u> children exited foster care due to age (10.4% decrease from 2020).
- 780 children were living with nonrelatives; 410 stayed with a relative.
- 261 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 6 children classified as runaways.
- 4% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

The decline since 2019 of children living in juvenile correction facilities.






Funding for Child Welfare Services

- South Dakota spent <u>\$76,297,222</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$34,948,721 = from the federal government
- \$40,183,724 = from state and local funds.


Federal Funding Sources, 2021



The significant funding sectors of the \$34,948,721 in federal funding received in South Dakota in 2020:

- \$7,103,167 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$6,448,013 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- South Dakota's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$6,371,525

Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>51%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 16% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 10% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$7,862</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$5,824 annual cost of home-based infant care






Child Poverty


- <u>48,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2022 (22% of all children).
- Average number of TANF recipients decreased from <u>5,096</u> in 2021 to <u>4,552</u> in 2022 (10.7% decrease).

Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, 2022




- <u>569</u> children, from birth to three-yearsold, are experiencing homelessness (1.24%)
- 41% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- 20% of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>2,244</u> total South Dakota residents living in public housing

Ochild Poverty Over Time



- The state spent \$9,032,493 on WIC in 2023, serving 15,241 people: a 1.2% increase in total participants and 11.6% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>98,580</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including 38,910 children.
- 45.8% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of South Dakota, 2020








Health

- <u>807</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (7.6% of births).
- <u>1,197</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (10.5%).
 - 9.5% of all White babies
 - 9.9% of all Black babies
- 506 births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 a rate of 17 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>87</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023 -- a rate of 8 per 1,000.

Medicaid Expansion


South Dakota has been a Medicaid expansion state since 07/01/2023

Maternal Mortality

• 16 South Dakota women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents

- <u>16000</u> children had no health insurance in 2023 (12.5% increase from 2022).
- <u>76,881</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (9.4% increase from 2020).
- 19,262 children in South Dakota were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (14.1% decrease from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>









Zero to Three

- 64% of babies live above low-income
- 15.5% of babies live at low income
- 20.5% of babies live in poverty
- 14.9% of babies live in deep poverty
- 80.1% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, South Dakota reported <u>33</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- South Dakota reported 23 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

South Dakota <u>has a Family First plan</u> submitted to the administration.


Teens & Youth

- <u>2,000</u> youth (16–19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2022 (3%)
- <u>15</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in South Dakota in 2022.

Mental Health

- <u>5,280</u> children received mental health treatment in South Dakota in 2022 (0.3%)
- In 2022, there were <u>33.7</u> deaths by suicide per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in South Dakota.

Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>5,977</u> children in South Dakota (1.9% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>182</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD
