
### Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Virginia had <u>90,952</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, <u>34,852</u> were screened in for response by CPS.
- 4,342 child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 2.4 children per 1,000 (29.5% decrease since 2019).
- Of the **4,342** children, **4,121** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims <1years, representing 559 of the 4,342 cases.

#### Types of Maltreatment Victims, 2023




### Workforce

There are <u>8,590</u> children, family, and school social workers in Virginia with a mean wage of \$29.65 (compared to Virginia's minimum wage: \$12.41)

#### Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- 90.9% = parents of the child.
- 9.1% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

#### Child victims (2023):

- 54.3% = female; 45.7% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>51</u> in 2022 to 55 in 2023.
- Texas reported 178 total child victims of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 1,622 victims and 13,395 non-victims.


## Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, 2023



### Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>7,279</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 5,039 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **2,372** children entered care and **2,240** exited.
- 792 children were adopted; 1,810 were waiting to be adopted.
- 1.2% increase in the number of children in care between 2021-2022. Adoptions from the system decreased by 9.8% from 2021.

#### Duration in Care, 2021





### Juvenile Justice


- <u>15,992</u> total arrests for children under 18 in 2019.
- 497 for Disorderly Conduct.
- 2,783 for Property Crimes.
- 1,852 for Drug Abuse Violations.
- <u>558</u> children lived in juvenile correction facilities in 2021 (decrease from **918** kids in 2019; 39% decline).

## Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? 2021



- In 2021, <u>413</u> children exited foster care due to age (24% decrease from 2020).
- 3,094 children were living with non-relatives; 476 stayed with a relative.
- 537 children were staying in group homes or institutions; **zero** children classified as runaways.
- 3% of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.






# Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Virginia spent <u>\$757,251,768.24</u> on child welfare services in 2020.
  - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$285,153,384.27 = from the federal government
- \$470,746,276.97 = from state and local funds.


#### Federal Funding Sources, 2020



The significant funding sectors of the \$285,153,384.27 in federal funding received in Virginia in 2020:

- \$72,987,184.74 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$70,687,785.77 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Virginia's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was \$57,289,922

### Child Care & Early Learning



- <u>25%</u> of Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 9% of Early Head Start eligible children are enrolled
- 7% of Child Care & Development Block Grant eligible children 5 and under are served
- <u>\$16,397</u> annual cost of center-based infant care
- \$12,158 annual cost of home-based infant care






### Child Poverty


- <u>407,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2023 (22% of all children).
- Average number of TANF recipients increased from <u>33,269</u> in 2021 to <u>37,698</u> in 2022 (13.3% increase).

#### Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, 2023




### HOUSING

- <u>5,418</u> children, from birth to threeyears-old, are experiencing homelessness (1.40%)
- 38.1% of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>28%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>25,033</u> total Virginia residents living in public housing



- The state spent \$68,905,844 on WIC in 2023, serving 123,107 people: a 1.6% increase in total participants and a 21.5% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>859,376</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including **12.6**% of children.
- 44.9% of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

## Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Virginia, 2020






### Health

- 7,812 low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (8.4% of births).
- <u>9,480</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2021 (9.9%).
  - 8.8% of all White babies
  - 13.6% of all Black babies
- 3,037 births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023
   -- a rate of 11 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>534</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023 -- a rate of 6 per 1,000.

#### Medicaid Expansion


Virginia is a <u>Medicaid expansion</u> state, implemented on 1/1/2019.

#### **Maternal Mortality**

- 158 Virginia women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in Virginia, there are 33 maternal deaths
  - <u>92,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2023 (a 5.7% increase from 2022).
  - 714,419 children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2021 (3.7% increase from 2020).
  - <u>221,231</u> children in Virginia were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (7.6% decrease from 2020).

## Health Insurance Coverage for Children, 2021






### Zero to Three

- 69.4% of babies live above low-income
- 16.1% of babies live at low income
- 14.5% of babies live in poverty
- 8% of babies live in deep poverty
- 81.4% of new parents have at least one parent working full time

#### Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Virginia reported <u>13</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Virginia reported 7 plans of safe care for screened-in infants.

Virginia has a Family First plan approved by the administration.


### Teens & Youth

- <u>26,000</u> youth (16–19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2022 (6%)
- <u>127</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Virginia in 2022.

### Mental Health

- <u>33,932</u> children received mental health treatment in Virginia in 2022 (1.8%)
- In 2022, there were <u>12.1</u> deaths by suicide per 100,000 adolescents aged 15-19 in Virginia.

#### Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>33,438</u> children in Virginia (1.3% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>1,070</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD
