
Child Maltreatment

- In 2023, Wisconsin had <u>72,977</u> total referrals for child abuse and neglect. Of those, 21,270 were screened in for response by CPS.
- 3,694 were child victims of abuse or neglect, at a rate of 3.0 children per 1,000 (19.3% decrease since 2019).
- Of the 3,694 children, **3,075** were first-time victims.
- Largest age group of victims = <1years, representing 362 of the 3,694 cases.




Types of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2023</u>

Workforce

There are <u>5,410</u> child, family, and school social workers in Wisconsin with a median wage of \$27.59 (compared to Wisconsin's minimum wage: <u>\$7.25</u>)








Perpetrators of child maltreatment (2023):

- $\underline{63\%}$ = parents of the child.
- 37% = non-parents or unknown relationship.

Child victims (2023):

- **49**% = female; **51**% = male.
- Child fatalities increased from <u>21</u> in 2022 to <u>22</u> in 2023.
- Wisconsin reported 0 total child victim of sex trafficking.
- Post-response services given to 1,554 victims and 2,106 non-victims.


Age Distribution of Maltreatment Victims, <u>2023</u>




Foster Care and Adoptions

- <u>10,290</u> total children were served by the foster care system in FY 2022.
- 6,622 in care as of 09/30/2022.
- During 2022, **3,615** children entered care and **3,669** exited.
- **649** children were adopted; **1,419** were waiting to be adopted.
- 2.2% decrease in the number of children in care between 2021–2022. Adoptions from the system also decreased by 8.6% from 2021.

Duration in Care, 2021




Where are Children in Foster Care Staying? <u>2021</u>



- In 2021, <u>352</u> children exited foster care due to age (5.6% decrease from 2020).
- 3,159 children were living with non-relatives; 2,692 stayed with a relative.
- 620 children were staying in group homes or institutions; 56 children classified as runaways.
- <u>2%</u> of households had a grandparent living with a grandchild.

Adoption, <u>2020</u>







Funding for Child Welfare Services

- Wisconsin spent <u>\$515,411,824</u> on child welfare services in 2020
 - Child welfare services = direct and administrative services
- \$172,086,158 = from the federal government
- \$335,525,363 = from state and local funds


Federal Funding Sources, 2020



The significant funding sectors of the \$<u>172,086,158</u> in federal funding received in Wisconsin in 2020:

- \$35,185,195 as part of the Title IV-E Total Foster Care Program.
- \$52,162,605 as part of the Title IV-E Adoption Assistance Program.
- Wisconsin's sum of expenditures for Social Service Block Grants in 2022 was <u>\$42,999,987</u>

Child Poverty

- <u>251,000</u> children lived with parents who lacked secure employment in 2023 (20% of all children).
- Average number of TANF recipients rose from <u>24,721</u> in 2022 to <u>26,600</u> in 2023 (7.6% increase).

Child Poverty by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2023</u>




- <u>5,619</u> children, from birth to threeyears-old, are experiencing homelessness (2.27%)
- <u>25.4%</u> of households receiving the Low Income Housing Tax Credit report having at least one member under 18
- <u>22%</u> of children lived in households with a high housing cost burden.
- <u>16,830</u> total Wisconsin residents living in public housing



- The state spent <u>\$27,636,826</u> on WIC in 2023, serving <u>89,41</u> people: a 6% increase in total participants and 12% increase in spending since 2022.
- <u>617,790</u> people were food insecure between 2021 and 2023, including 204,750 children.
- <u>37.2%</u> of households receiving SNAP benefits in 2021 had children.

Total Urban vs. Rural Population of Wisconsin, <u>2020</u>








Health

- <u>4,685</u> low birth-weight babies (<5.5lbs) born in 2023 (7.8% of births).
- <u>6,157</u> preterm births (<37wks) in 2022 (10.26% of births).
 - 9.55% of all White babies
 - 15.9% of all Black babies
- <u>1,882</u> births to mothers aged 15-19 in 2023 -- a rate of 10 in every 1,000 teen girls.
- <u>348</u> infants aged <1yr died in 2023; a rate of **5.8** per 1,000.


Percentage of All Preterm Births by Race or Ethnicity, <u>2022</u>



Maternal Mortality

- <u>41</u> Wisconsin women died while pregnant, or within 42 days post pregnancy from any cause relating to or aggravated by said pregnancy, excluding accidents and incidents
- For every 100,000 live births in Wisconsin, there are **13** maternal deaths
- <u>54,000</u> children had no health insurance in 2023 (10% decrease from 2022).
- <u>446,000</u> children were enrolled in Medicaid in 2023 (3% increase from 2022).
- <u>108,981</u> children in Wisconsin were in the state Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in 2021 (37% decrease from 2020).

Health Insurance Coverage for Children, <u>2021</u>






Zero to Three

- <u>67.5%</u> of babies live above low-income
- 17.3% of babies live at low income
- 15.2% of babies live in poverty
- 7.4% of babies live in deep poverty
- **79.5%** of new parents have at least one parent working full time

Plans for Safe Care

- In 2023, Wisconsin reported <u>0</u> infants screened in with prenatal substance exposure.
- Plans of safe care were not needed.

Wisconsin <u>does have a Family First</u> <u>plan</u> approved by the administration.


Teens & Youth

- <u>17,000</u> youth (16–19yrs) were not in school nor working in 2023 (5%)
- <u>Zero</u> children <19yrs were killed by a firearm in Wisonsin in 2020.

Mental Health

- <u>13,205</u> children received mental health treatment in Wisconsin in 2022 (0.7%)
- In 2022 there were <u>10.6</u> deaths from suicide per 100,000 adolescents aged 15–19 in Wisconsin.

Substance Use

- From 2015 to 2019, an average of <u>32,758</u> children in Wisconsin (1.6% of the state's child population) lived with parents having a substance use disorder.
- On March 31st, 2023, <u>1,697</u> clients 18 and under were in treatment for SUD.
